

FSA Food Pantry (Started in April 2022)

In partnership with the Commission on Economic Opportunity (CEO), has started a food pantry for those who receive services at FSA NEPA. CEO will provide non-perishable food items as well as other household staples such as cleaning products, diapers, and menstrual products. FSA NEPA is also accepting appropriate donations from affiliates. Food insecurity continues to affect families at higher rates than ever and FSA NEPA is grateful for the opportunity to be able to provide some assistance to families. Since the program's inception in April 2022 through June 2022, the pantry has served 16 families, with 7 of them accessing the food pantry more than twice. In June 2022, FSA NEPA launched a collection for the Food Pantry to recognize National Hunger Month, collecting donations from the organization's affiliates. Overall, the donations exceeded 454lbs of food. As a result, the Food Pantry was expanded into a larger space at FSA NEPA as it outgrew the originally designated room.



While every family has benefited and has been appreciative, one specific family has been incredibly grateful as they have been transitioning from a hotel after experiencing a long period of houselessness. Supplemental food and hygiene products allowed them to save a few extra dollars towards their new home, which they have recently moved into. After asking their clinician for a little extra help with laundry detergent, they were able to thoroughly clean all of their linens and clothes before moving. Having these comforts in their home was worth more than anything- which is actually what the FSA Food Pantry is aiming to do.



Intensive Family Reunification Service

works directly with families, children, community, and courts to address these problems.

Turning Points

teaches women who are abusive in their home, that violence is not a solution to problems.







High Risk Youth Re-Entry

Caseworkers in this program work directly with children who are deemed high risk. <u>Served 648 children</u> at risk for delinquency or dependency.

In the past fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, FSA High-Risk Youth served 64 youth and their families, with a rate of

91% not re-offending.

At this time, FSA has served 791 youth and their families with a rate

82.3% not re-offending.



Anger Management


for individuals who want to learn to control their anger before it gets them into any further, more permanent trouble.

Counseling

providing confidential counseling for families, couples, and individuals addressing the personal, mental, and relationship challenges of life.

Batterers Intervention Services

for men who are ready to take responsibility for abusive behavior and make a permanent change regarding how they interact with loved ones.



Family Finding

seeks to find other family members or potential guardians who might take over custody of that child successfully.



Blended Perspective Meetings Bring the identified connection network together to discuss the Strengths, Needs, and Biggest Unmet needs of the Child(ren).
